- More fun to grade!!!




Getting Started

What kinds of projects need IRB?

• The Federal Register (2018, Title 45, Subtitle A, Subchapter A, Part 46) defines research as: " a systematic investigation, including research development, testing, and evaluation, designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge". Therefore, data collection that is not designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge would not be defined as research. Examples include data collection only for assessment, program evaluation, quality assurance, quality improvement, oral histories, journalism.

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IRB Process: Course Approval

- Submit course approval application to <u>irb@csbsju.edu</u> (ideally before the start of the semester)
- Guide students to conduct projects that fit within Course Approval
- Provide good templates for students
- Submit projects to IRB (usually me[©])


What qualifies for Course Approval?


- All participants must belong to the CSB/SJU campus community, and all in-person research must be conducted on the CSB/SJU campuses.
- All participants must be at least 18 years old, and no vulnerable populations can be recruited (children, prisoners, undocumented migrants etc)
- The research must pose no more than minimal risk to participants (no more than
- Projects cannot cause participants to feel physically or psychologically threatened or involve procedures with more than minimal physical pain/discomfort.
- No names or other personal identifiers can be connected to any research data, and only non-sensitive information may be collected from participants.
- No deception about risks or other information that could influence individuals' willingness to participate is allowed.

Coding Data

- Group coding protocols
 - Pre-set codes
 - Emergent codes
 - Interrater reliability

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Writing Research Reports

- Deemphasis on standard research paper

- Choice to write individual paper or group paper
- Research findings structure
