From With Lamps Burning:

When the disturbances of two world wars broke in upon the normal life of the college, students and faculty cooperated with the government's war efforts. During World War I sisters and students did all they possibly could in sewing and knitting for soldiers. In World War II the college was permitted to establish its own Red Cross unit — one of the first college units to be set up in Minnesota. The output of this surgical dressing unit doubled that of any other unit of the county.

Faculty and students signed up as blood donors each time the mobile blood donor unit came to St. Cloud. On one occasion seventy sisters from the college and the convent responded. Several of the sisters were so generous that they were enrolled in the gallon club. Some sisters and students joined in first aid classes; others conducted the sale of war bonds and stamps.²⁰

If not the first, St. Benedict's was one of the first colleges in the state to organize a separate unit of the Red Cross during World War II. Sisters Irma, Jeanette, Remberta, Estelle, and Grace received the Red Cross silver pin for their donations to the Blood Mobile.

Miss Diederichs Dies Suddenly

Miss Sabina Diederichs, 68, for 28 years resident nurse at St. John's died of a heart attack Jan. 22 in St. Mary's Hospital, Minneapolis, where she had gone for treatment a week earlier.

While on duty in the infirmary in February, 1948, Miss Diederichs suffered a broken hip in a fall. This ended a term of faithful service dating to 1920, when she came here from St. Michael's hospital, Grand Forks, N. Dak.

After nearly three years of hospitalization, Miss Diederichs had returned to St. John's last fall, and she had hoped to resume nursing after her recovery.

Thousands of students from all over the country had become acquainted with Miss Diederichs during her work here. Many of the monks, brothers, and students had been treated by her in sickness and accidents. She was noted for her cheerfulness, her sympathy, and her keen intelligence.

She was an Oblate of St. Benedict, belonging to St. John's Abbey. Funeral services were held at the Benedictine parish of St. Boniface in Minneapolis, and burial took place in Aberdeen, S. Dak.

At Bloodmobile 'Party'

●The St. John's Pre-Med Club opened its spring blood drive on Thursday, Mar. 21, in an effort to fill the Johnny Blood Bank goal. Approximately 60 red blooded donors were signed up and tested in the Alumni lounge by technicians from the St. Cloud Hospital staff.

The Johnny Blood Bank started the school year with 33 pints of blood in its account. The Blood Bank's goal for this year was set at 100 pints. Until the recent drive, 75 pints of that goal had been obtained from former soliciting by Pre-Meds.

With 60 more donors signed up to give blood, the goal was not only reached, but far surpassed.

According to Blood Bank chair-

man Norm Virzig, the drive was a bursting success. Each week between now and the end of the school year Pre-Med Marty Havel, with his blood-red 1954 Ford convertible, will drive Johnnies to the St. Cloud Hospital to give the life-saving fluid.

The St. John's Blood Bank is officially subsidized by the Student Council because the bank is open to all Johnnies. A little-known fact is that the St. John's Blood Bank is also available to all Johnnies and their immediate families. Also included in the bank are priests, brothers, and workmen of St. John's. If at any time an individual in one of those groups needs blood, it is given free of charge to him anywhere in the continental United States.

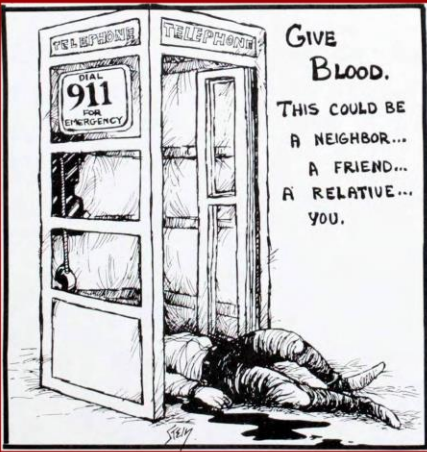

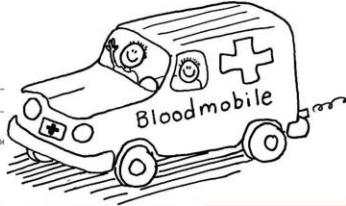
**Bloodmobile:

Someone, somewhere needs you. You have the power to help them. The Red Cross Blood Service appeals to you to come and give blood on November 10 or 11.

For those of you who have never given blood, the actual process of giving blood takes between 5 and 15 minutes. But you would spend a total of 45-60 minutes at the bloodmobile to allow for medical history, health check and time for snacks and relaxation. Yes, they do have cookies and donuts to munch on! And provided that you feel well you can go about your merry way. You will even be able to study.

Many of you may have associated giving blood with the disease AIDS. What is AIDS? According to a pamphlet provided by the Red Cross, "Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome is a destructive disease of the immune system which can lead to severe infections and a rare type of skin cancer. The cause of AIDS is not known."



Blood donors might wonder if they are at any risk of contracting AIDS through donations. But Red Cross says that "blood donors are not at any risk of contracting AIDS. Both needles and blood donation bags are used only once and then discarded."

What could happen if people quit giving blood regularly because they fear contracting AIDS or they are afraid of needles? Millions of lives would suffer. These people who need transfusions would be in jeopardy of losing their lives. Again, Red Cross Blood Service appeals to you to help save lives. So come to the bloodmobile on Nov. 10 or 11 at CSB Regina Basement.

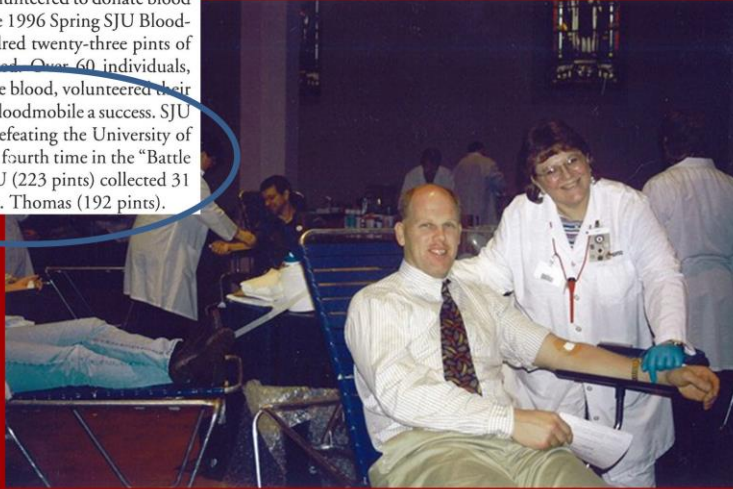

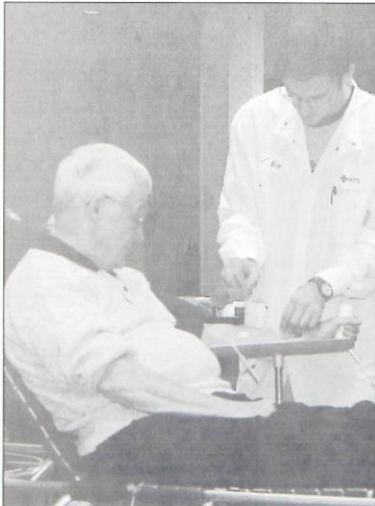
Thank You to the Bloodmobile Donors

A heartfelt thank you goes out to the 261 individuals who volunteered to donate blood May 6 and 7, at the 1996 Spring SJU Bloodmobile. Two hundred twenty-three pints of blood were collected. Over 60 individuals, many who also gave blood, volunteered their time to make the Bloodmobile a success. SJU was successful in defeating the University of St. Thomas for the fourth time in the "Battle for the Blood." SJU (223 pints) collected 31 more pints than St. Thomas (192 pints).

Monk donates 9 gallons of blood

According to the American Red Cross, every two seconds someone is in need of blood.

While many students, faculty and staff at CSB/SJU are overcome with fears, such as the idea of a needle in their arm, one man has clearly overcome any apprehension of donating blood.

Fr. Daniel Durken gave a double donation of blood to the American Red Cross blood mobile Monday in the Great Hall.

Durken has been a red-blood cell donor for 30 years and completed his 72nd and 73rd donations this week.

After these donations, Durken has given a running total of nine gallons. Durken's first donation was in 1974.

"Once you get started, you get hooked," Durken said. During the past 10-15 years, Durken has been dedicated to donating as much as possible.

The American Red Cross requires 56 days between donations, which can be as many as five donations a year.

According to the Red Cross, one person's donation may be enough to help save three lives.

With data like this available, still only 5 percent of the eligible U.S. population donates blood in any given year.

Durken, however, is one of the faithful.

"I will continue giving blood as long as I am healthy," Durken said.

The CSB/SJU campuses bring in experts from the

American Red Cross numerous times a year, and whenever possible Durken facilitates these resources.

Whenever the bloodmobile is not on campus Durken goes into St. Cloud to donate where he can continue his life-saving habit.

"Donating blood is something to feel good about, as there is always a shortage of blood," Durken said.

So why has Durken continued donating all these years?

"Until we can manufacture blood in labs, our nation's people are depending on us to save lives," Durken said.

Being an O+ blood type, Durken's blood is universal and allows him to give to any other blood type.

Regardless of the blood type, all blood is equally valuable, and Durken encourages students to try something new or to take friends with to appointments.

According to the Red Cross, in order to give blood for a transfusion to another person, you must be healthy, be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds and not have donated blood in the past 56 days.

Potential donors fill out questionnaires at every donation to make sure that the donor is in fact eligible to donate, and even if the donor is not eligible, the Red Cross is always looking for volunteers when the blood mobile comes to campus.
