





1908 - April-May: the cranberry marsh was drained and made into an athletic field 800'x 240' (AA VII 35). Heretofore all athletie activities had been carried on north of the quadrangle--on either the upper or the lower fields--or on the "campus"-- the field lying east of the main buildings, stretching to the "great dismal swamp". Of course both of these areas continued to be used for more of the major sports passed to the new "campus until that place became the center of all major athletic activity.

In 1909, the first SJU football field, referred to as the 'Natural Bowl,' was completed...

However, just a year later, football at SJU was abolished on the grounds that it promoted "unfriendliness towards other schools."

'The Bowl' stood vacant for ten years until 1920, when the Johnnies joined the MIAC.

So the photo would be further proof that football was indeed still being played at St. John's between 1916 and 1921, but in the open space just north of the Quad, not in the "Natural Bowl" nor against other schools.


