This sophomore summer I went to Mostar, Bosnia and Herzegovina for my environmental studies internship through the Center for Global Education. I was assigned the internship site Eko Centar in Blagaj, a beautiful town near Mostar. First of all, I was really excited that I got accepted into this program. I've heard so many good things about it before I applied for it. Since this program was getting increasingly competitive every year, I felt exceedingly fortunate that I stood out as one of the interns. Luckily, not only was I assigned an internship site that was related to my major but also was I able to work with another environmental studies major, Yao Yang, from CSBSU.



Now two months have gone by in a blink of an eye and I'm back to Shanghai, I still couldn't believe how amazing my experience in BiH was. Sometimes when I wake up in the morning, I feel I can still jump out of the bus instantly and grab the 7:45 bus heading to Blagaj with Yao. We would get off the bus a few bus stops earlier and get fresh chocolate or cherry pastries from the local bakery. Then we would walk twenty minutes along the Burna River to Eco Centar, greeting local people on our way and picking fresh cherries from the tree. Once we got there, we opened the bar, unlocked the multimedia center, the workroom and prepared food for the shepherd dogs (Dolly and Box) and Herzegovinian donkeys. Simply sitting on the bench and looking around at the Eco Centar was an enjoyment for a kid growing up with the bustle and bustle of the Chinese cities like me.



The location before the Eco Centar was built used to be a harsh river valley abandoned as a dumpsite. Around seven years ago, Ada and ten other volunteers started building the Centar a little by little from hand, piling up bricks and planting pomegranate trees for the bar area. They built the small bar, the tables and the benches, the donkey stable and the resting space for shepherd dogs.

The Eco Centar of Blagaj was inaugurated in 2007 with the aim of contributing to nature conservation and increasing environmental awareness. It is a project under the non-profit organization Novi Val. Nine years after it was established, the youth club Novi Val started the project entitled "Eco development in rural areas of Bosnia and Herzegovina and Serbia." Within this project, Novi Val is carrying out activities through several programs: protection of the white vultures, development of cattle farming, protection of the indigenous Tornjak dog species, protection of the Velez Pramenka sheep, preservation of biodiversity, protection of cultural and historical monuments of Blagaj, as well as educational and eco tourism programs.

Now after seven years, the bar area is protected very nicely by all the pomegranate trees from sunlight and rainfall. Eco Centar has become a very nice gathering place for the local community. Our coworkers use the abundant pomegranate fruit every year to make juice concentrate to serve the guests at the Eco Centar.
