

Eugene McCarthy's Days at St. John's



- Came to St. John's Prep in 1931 at age 15;
- no yearbooks for 1931-32
- The **next spring**, in May 1932, he graduates, 2nd in the class of 41, two months over age 16.
- Ironically, the future poet and senator got As in all his classes except English the first semester and business law the second semester.
- He graduates from SJU three years later, just barely 19.



That was the classic photo (of the University team, not a Prep School team)


That year the hockey team was **0-6**, and scored **5 goals total**, in this 1st year of conference play.



- took the championship in their third year of conference play;
- McCarthy scored **7 goals** on the season, and was the high scorer (scoring **half the team's points**)





The really breathtaking accomplishment is yet to be revealed. In order not to heighten the suspense too much, we will state now as briefly as we can that this young tower of talent made local collegiate history by registering eight A's in his classwork two years ago, and has continued that splendid work. 

- Returned to St. John's to teach Economics and Education in 1940-43



The team went 1-6 on the season, scoring a total of **9 goals all season**.

McCarthy Considered Monastic Life

He and Abigail didn't marry until 1945, after he'd:

- taught for two years at SJU,
- been a novice in the Abbey for 9 months in 1943,
- served as a code breaker in the Army, in. D.C.

(Yes, it's not uncommon for someone to try monastic life here, but leave it to marry...!)
