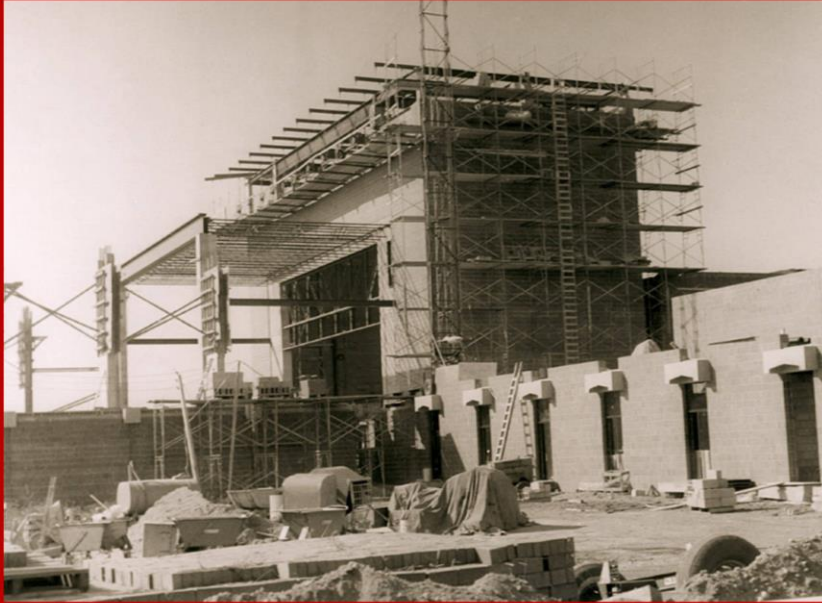


In League with the Future: The First Fifty Years
History of the College of Saint Benedict
A Homecoming Address, Spring 1964
Sister Mariella Gable, O.S.B.

Students of yesterday and students of today, faculty members and friends, welcome to our birthday party! We are celebrating the founding of our College, fifty years ago in the year 1913 - 14. I am very happy that it has fallen to my lot to tell you the history of our College; it is an exciting and heartening record. Actually, I have been here forty-nine of those fifty years; so I have a good deal of first-hand information. I have read all the reports in the offices written by past presidents, deans and registrars. I don't know if this is true, but I suppose I am the only person in the world who has done that. Furthermore, I have interviewed everyone who is still alive and remembers something about our past. Actually, I have put in a few hundred hours preparing this history. I hope you are not expecting just a selection of funny stories. This is really history, and I am given only forty five minutes in which to tell about fifty years, not even a minute per year, which means that I must leave out many things--so many wonderful stories which I would like to share with you.

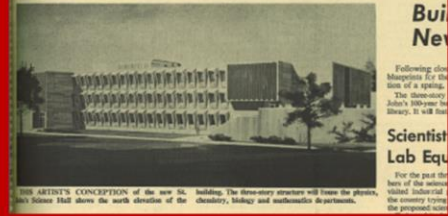

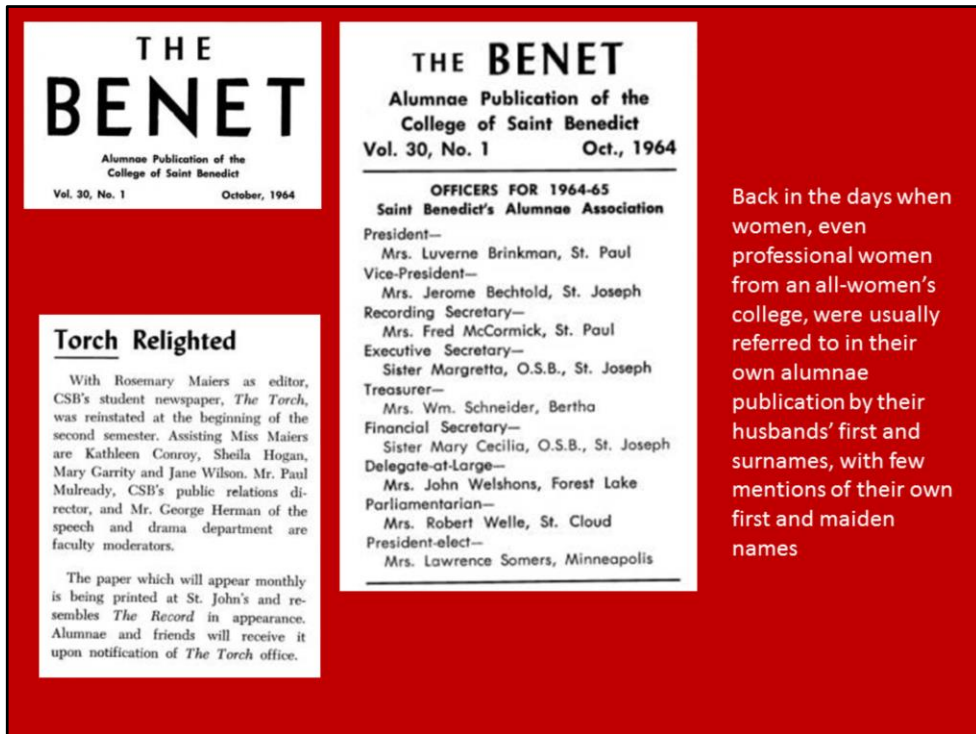

New Radiation Lab Now in Use

In 1963 the College of St. Benedict received a grant from the Atomic Energy Commission which has been used for a new radiation laboratory equipped with six radiation scalars, including a geiger counter. Other new equipment includes two radiation analysis units, a single channel analyzer and a monitor.

Because of space limitations, lab work, other than the actual radiation counting, must be carried on in other laboratories.

Four faculty members, Sister Mary, Sister Rogatia, Sister Gonzaga and Mr. Zaczkowski, have had training programs in radiation studies. The new laboratory will be used by the biology, chem-

istry and physics departments. Elaine Faulkner, a senior biology major, is currently doing a unit on the phenomenon of radioactive properties in fish.

Sister Gonzaga is presently conducting a three-credit course in radiation studies with a year of chemistry or physics as a prerequisite. Among those registered for the course are personnel from the laboratories of the St. Cloud Hospital.

Sister Gonzaga said, "In the near future we hope that all students in the lab science courses will be able to use the radiation laboratory and acquaint themselves with one of the modern, powerful methods of scientific investigation."

Woman's Role Explored in Weekend Talks

Carol said the purpose of the event is "to offer students on our campus an opportunity to concentrate on the essence of their femininity. With speakers and discussions we hope to grow in understanding of what it means to be a woman."

Night Classes Attract Varied Student Body

Local teachers, housewives, and professional people are now playing the student role at St. Benedict's. Thirty-seven adults enrolled in Sister Johanna's two introductory pottery courses which meet Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

The thing which makes this a first, says Sister Johanna, is the class enrollment: there is a wide variety of individuals whose professional calling is not art.

Sister Johanna, briskly brushing the pottery dust off her habit, enumerated some of her heterogeneous students: three Sisters from the St. Cloud Hospital staff; Michael Beique, SJU French teacher; Agatha Gertken, St. Joseph postmistress; Sister M. Cecilia, CSB treasurer; Dr. Robert Kelly, St. Joseph dentist; Margaret Faulkner, a postulant and teacher at St. Benedict's High School; Sister Hildebrand, who is maintenance chief in the Art Department; three Bennies, only one an art major; two Johnnies, an art major and a science major; Mrs. Ellis, wife of Dr. Stewart Ellis of Cold Spring. Mrs. Ellis has practically attained an M.A. in the fine arts and is taking the ceramic course to complete her study.

Also taking the course is Michael Humphrey, a professional silversmith from St. Cloud. Sister Johanna smilingly recalled Hum-

phrey's father who at one time taught jewelry design at St. Ben's. "The girls in his class used to make their own engagement and wedding rings," remarked Sister Johanna.

Sister explained that in these courses she introduces her students to an elementary study of pottery design. Students produce their pottery by hand and by the wheel. Around the pottery work room are examples of students' projects employing the slab, coil, stretch, and pinch techniques.

The classes only meet once a week, but the work shop is always open to the adult students during the day. "The wheel is pretty busy all day," explained Sister Johanna. The swirling sound of the wheel, maneuvered skilfully by Mrs. Sylvester Theisen, CSB French teacher and busy member of the night class, affirmed the statement. "One day," recalled Sister Johanna, "Mike Humphrey came at 9:30 a.m. He brought his lunch and remained all day. These students mean business; pottery isn't just a hobby.

"All of the students show great enthusiasm," continued Sister Johanna. The temperature was 25-below the first night of class, yet all the students came. The next class period there was a blizzard which may have chilled the weather but not the enthusiasm. "In spring they'll probably go through floods," she laughed.

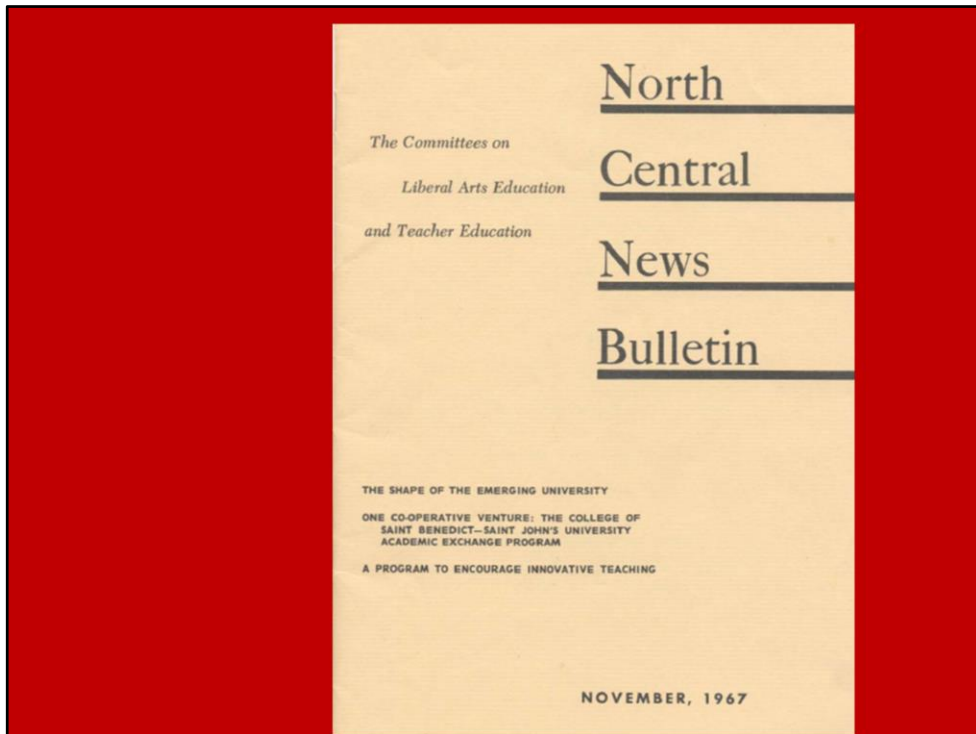

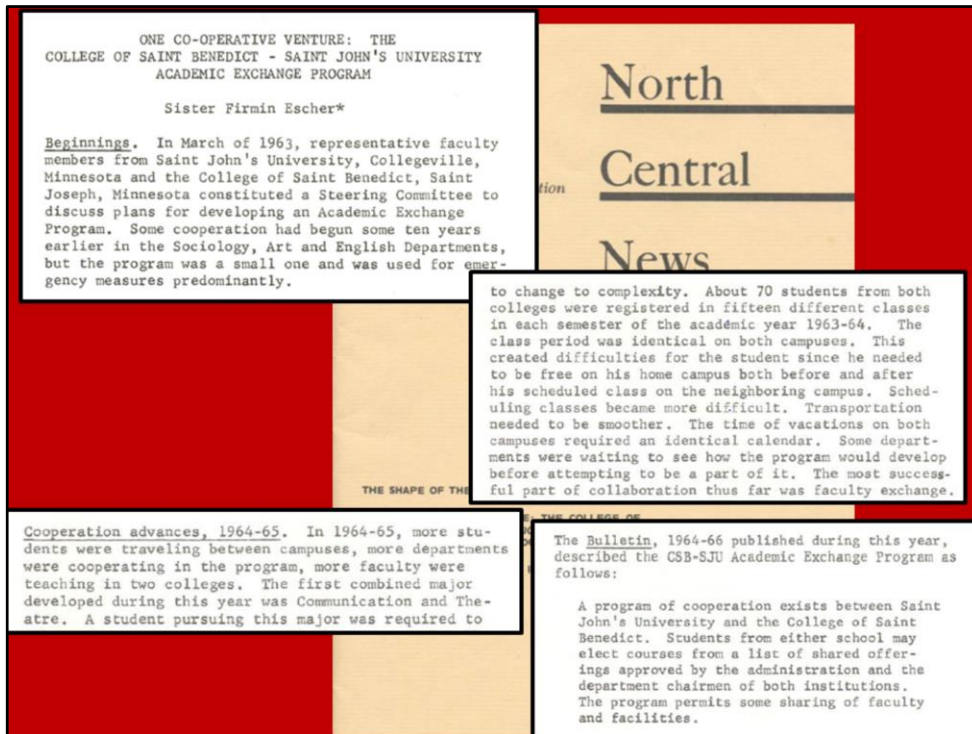


