Monks' Migration

170 years ago:

1846: Monks leave Metten, Germany and go to Latrobe, to St. Vincent's



160 years ago:

1856: Monks arrive in St. Cloud

1864: Monks move to "Indianbush"



150 years ago:

1866: Monks move to "Lake St. Louis" and elect their first Abbot





Boniface Wimmer was in Europe, lobbying to have the St. Cloud Priory upgraded to be an Abbey.

The main objection was that the buildings were not adequate.

Wimmer maintained that:

this deficiency would soon be supplied, since the foundations had been laid and there were no debts. The cardinals decided that the St. Cloud Priory should be advanced to abbey status, and that the abbot of the new abbey should be elected for life. This was a major accomplishment in Wimmer's life

June 4, 1866:

The cardinals of the Congregation of the Propagation of the Faith approved Wimmer's petitions.


August 3, 1866:

An Apostolic Brief was issued by Pope Pius IX:

"Finding that this priory, both by reason of the number of religious belonging to it...and by reason of the adequacy of its resources ...we raise the Priory to the rank of an Abbey."


An 1870 German drawing shows Pius IX as "Papst und König" -- "Pope and King"

Saint John's in the Indian Bush, 1864-1867 - drawing by Alexius Hoffmann in the SJAA





The electors:

- 1. Prior Benedict Haindl, administrator during the interim
- 2. Frater Joseph Vill, solemnly professed deacon
- 3. Fathers Meinulph Stuckenkemper and
- 4. Anthony Capser came out from St. Cloud, picking up
- 5. Father Wolfgang Northman at St. Joseph.
- 6. Fathers Cornelius Wittmann, a former prior, and
- 7. Anschar Frauendorfer drove over from Richmond and St. Augusta.
- 8. Another former prior, Othmar Wirtz, assistant at Assumption Church in St. Paul, carried delegation to act as proxy for
- 9. The pastor, Clement Staub. With Father Othmar came
- 10. Father George Scherer of Waconia.
- 11. Father Eberhard Gahr at Shakopee had appointed a proxy, as had
- 12. Demetrius di Marogna, the community's first prior, who had gone to Florida for the winter because of rapidly failing health.

"Abbot Boniface then led his nine monks into the main room of the frame farm house and opened the chapter meeting according to the ancient forms of the Bavarian Benedictine Ritual.

Abbot Wimmer gave an opening address on the importance of the occasion and the achievements of the last ten years which they had accomplished in spite of trials and hardships.

He admonished his assembled sons to choose as abbot one who was outstanding in wisdom and virtue as well as zeal for the advancement of the kingdom of God and the good traditions of the Benedictine Order."



ABBOJ OF INDIAN BUST

FR. COLMAN BARRY, O.S.B.

HOSE nine Benedictine pioneers who gathered at the old Collegeville farm December 12, 1866, were about to make their most signal decision since the beginnings of the Minnesota foundation ten long years before. For in June of that year Abbot Boniface Wimmer had written from Rome that the Congregation of Propaganda had acted on his request and agreed to raise their St. Cloud Priory to the status of an abbey, independent of the mother house, St. Vincent's in Pennsylvania.

And now they were together to choose their first abbot; Abbot Boniface had come in person to preside over a chapter he had dreamed about and planned for since coming to America. The sown seed had taken root and persevered. His first mission had come of age.

Prior Benedict Haindl, administrator during the interim between priory and abbey statue, had made the arrangements for this chapter, with the help of Father Joseph Vill, solemnly professed deacon, who was going to make his first capitular decision that day. Fathers Meinulph Stuken-kenper and Anthony Capser came out from St. Cloud, picking up Father Wolfgang Northmann at St. Joseph; former Prior Cornelius Wittmann and Father Anschar Framendorfer drove overfrom Richmond, and another former prior, Father Othmar Wirs, assistant to Father Glement Staub at Assumption parish in St. Faul, was present with procuratorial delegation from Father Clement. They were twelve in all that day, counting Father Eberhard Cahr who had delegated his capitular vote, as had old Father Demetrius de Marogna, the former prior and original guardian of the infant mission during the first years of missionary labors and settlement, but who was now sick in Florida.

Abbot Boniface informed the abbot of Metten, Utto Lang, of these events:

"I presided over the election. Fr. Rupert was elected unanimously by the twelve capitulars in a large house in the midst of a forest of 2,600 acres which belong to the monastery. This was on December 12. The weather was very cold, but we sang the *Te Deum* very enthusiastically in the neat chapel."
