Boniface Wimmer's "firsts" for the Benedictines in the U.S.

- Established the first Benedictine monastery in North America despite the doubts of many church leaders both in America and Europe
- Created the first modern Benedictine monastery whose monks were predominantly lay brothers upon whom the prosperity of the community at St. Vincent depended.
- Convinced the bishop of Pittsburgh to name him the first "irremovable" pastor in the U.S. by granting him and his successors perpetual rights to the parish at St. Vincent.
- Persuaded the Holy See to establish St. Vincent as the first exempt religious community in the United States.


What seemed unattainable goals to others were merely challenges to meet and overcome for the *Projektenmacher* of Metten.

Right Reverend Father Abbot, Dearest Confrere: I was not able to answer your last letter until now because of pressing business. Your cleric will be very welcome, but because he writes of having trouble with his stomach, he might not be fit for our abbey. Our meals are still very rough, especially on fast days.

We drink neither beer nor wine, although in the near future I shall start building a brewery.


In some of our priories, the food is even worse than here. In other places it is much better.

Father Henry speaks of him in his letter and says he is ready to transfer to St. Vincent. I have nothing against it. I just want to make it clear to him that he cannot expect too much. The mission life, in reality, offers few attractions, though there will be plenty of work for him to do.

Still, I do have a dread of hypochondriacs and candidates that lack mental stability.

Father Henry has rendered me extraordinary service. I only wish he would bring many robust brothers so that our forests could provide more daylight. We get plenty of students. This year two were ordained priests.... In addition, we have 24 clerics, i.e. students in philosophy and theology.



We have some 20 scholastics. As a result, I have no need for a new generation, though I am always in need of money.

[In June] a frost killed our whole winter wheat crop. I got more than \$3,000 (8,000 florins). I got only half a bushel and now must buy wheat at a cost of as the same in Carrolltown, Indiana, and St. Marys. We had to buy wheat everywhere because for a radius of 100 miles, everything was killed by the bitter cold.



This year there is wonderful outlook on nature. May it please God to keep it that way. Otherwise, it will be very bad for us because we feel the pressure of not having money. Everywhere commerce and business are at a standstill, and at the same time, there is not enough on the table for certain hypochondriacs. Something has to be done.

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
