











Debate Squad Shows Promise



Debate Teams Compete In Final Tournament

St. John's debate team will close out its season today and tomorrow, April 12 and 13, by attending the upper Upper Midwest Debate Tournament sponsored by the University of Minnesota.

The entire 8-man Johnny debate squad will attend the meet. Mike Burns, a freshman debating for the first time in college, has joined the group to round out the squad.

The Upper Midwest classic comprises a trio of debating divisions, St. John's entering men in all three. The first trio, the freshman and beginners' divisions, any Midwest college may enter. However, only 2- and 4-year Minnesota colleges may compete in the third, or Minnesota division.

Two of the Johnny debaters, Keith and Kevin Hughes, last week displayed something of the caliber of debating that can be expected from the SJU squad. On Thursday, April 6, in the university auditorium, they matched wits and words in a no-decision contest with two Harvard University debaters, Bob O'Neill and Greg Hall. The former, a senior, is considered to be one of Harvard's top debaters.


The Hughes twins defended the negative side of the question, Resolved: That the Non-Agriculture Industrial Should Grant a Guaranteed Annual Wage. A large audience attended the event.

In another related activity Mr. Edward Henry, debate coach, to-day took a discussion team to to the Upper-Midwest tournament. The object of such meets is to develop skill in logical discussion of a current problem.

Each group is given two hours to discuss a sub-topic of the problem: Public Policy Towards Integration. Judgment is based entirely on a written report produced by the group within this time limit.

Members of the Johnny team, including one alternate, are: Russ Streefland, Bill Blanz, Ron Futz, Raphael Miller, and Julian Doran. St. John's placed third in this event last year.

Debaters Shine In Final Tourney

The St. John's Debate Team establishing a new milestone, dominated this year's Upper Mid-West Debate Tournament, April 13-14, at the University of Minnesota by sweeping both first and second places in the varsity division and second place in the freshman

This is the first year any John-ny debate team has taken a first in the tourney. The Hughes twins, Keith and Kevin, brought home the first-place trophy.

Seventeen colleges and universtiles, from as far as Wayne Uni-versity, Detroit, Mich., and rang-ing all over the upper mid-west, participated in the debate tournament.

Teams in the meet were classi-Teams in the meet were classi-fied in three divisions; freshmen, varsity, and non-varsity St. John's entered two varsity teams, one frosh team, and one non-varsity team. All four St. John's teams ad-

vanced to the semi-finals, which included twelve teams in all. In the finals St. John's had half the representative teams—three out of the final six. In the varsity finals, Keith and Kevin Hughes defeated an oppos-

ing blood-brother Johnny team, Larry Koll and James Adams, by a two-to-one decision. Taking second place in the frosh division, John Brandl and Gerald Esselman were out-argued in a two-to-one decision by the University

of South Dakota debate team:
The Hughes' team struts an impressive 25-3 season record, the best record of any Johnny debate team. St. John's was also represented

at the tourney by a discussion team. Six colleges were entered and discussed the question of "Northern States' Policy Towards Integration."

Hughes twins. Debating as partners, they compiled an impressive 25-3 record, which culminated in an exhibition debate with a Harvard University team.

Now in their fifth year of debating (2 years at Cathedral High, St. Cloud), Keith and Kevin Hughes speak highly of their debating experiences, their debate coach, Dr. Edward L. Henry, and

This debate was at the Northwest Debate Tournament at St. Thomas last spring. Debating with several-times national champion Kansas University, the twins were defeated by a score of 14 to a per-fect score of 15.

At the Upper-Midwest Debate Tournament two weeks later at the University of Minnesota, the Hughes brothers won first place in the varsity division, and the St. John's entry among 17 schools finished first and second in the varsity division and second in the freshman division.

The sons of Fred Hughes, '32, St. Cloud attorney, the twins are good students, serious about their education. They regard their de-bate training as one of the leading formative contributions to attaining general maturity.

The twin brothers have a very The twin brothers have a very valuable advantage in preparing their debate cases by living to-gether. "We are able to work together constantly until we are thinking as one; this greatly reduces the possibility of our contradicting one another while debating," they say.
