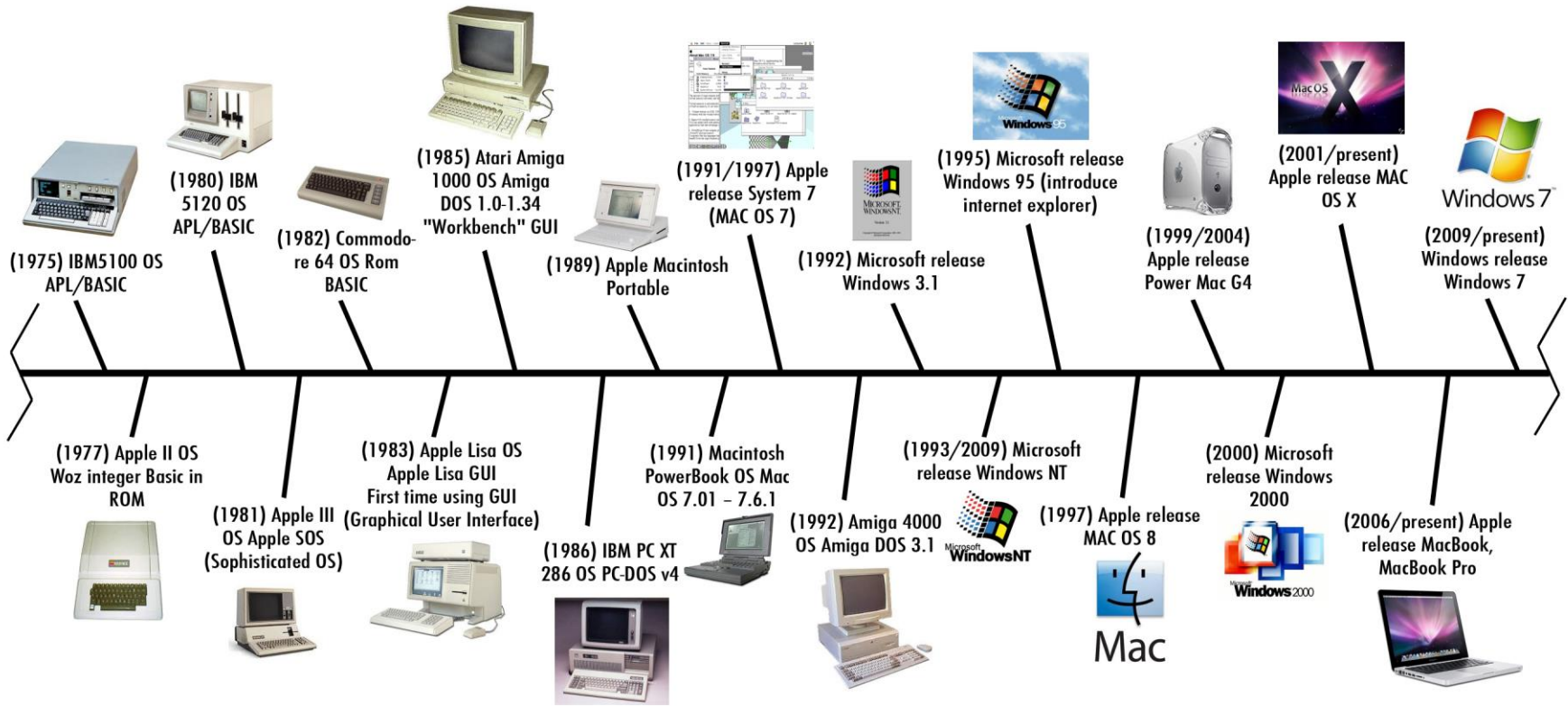

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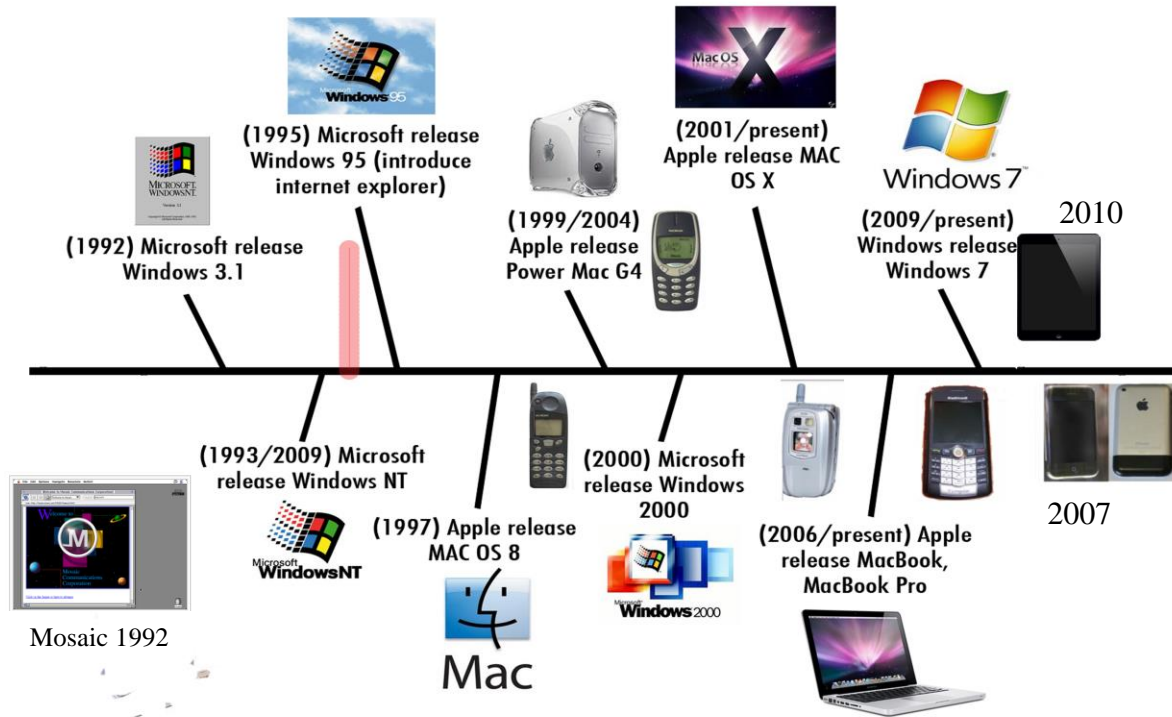

Driving Force Timeline

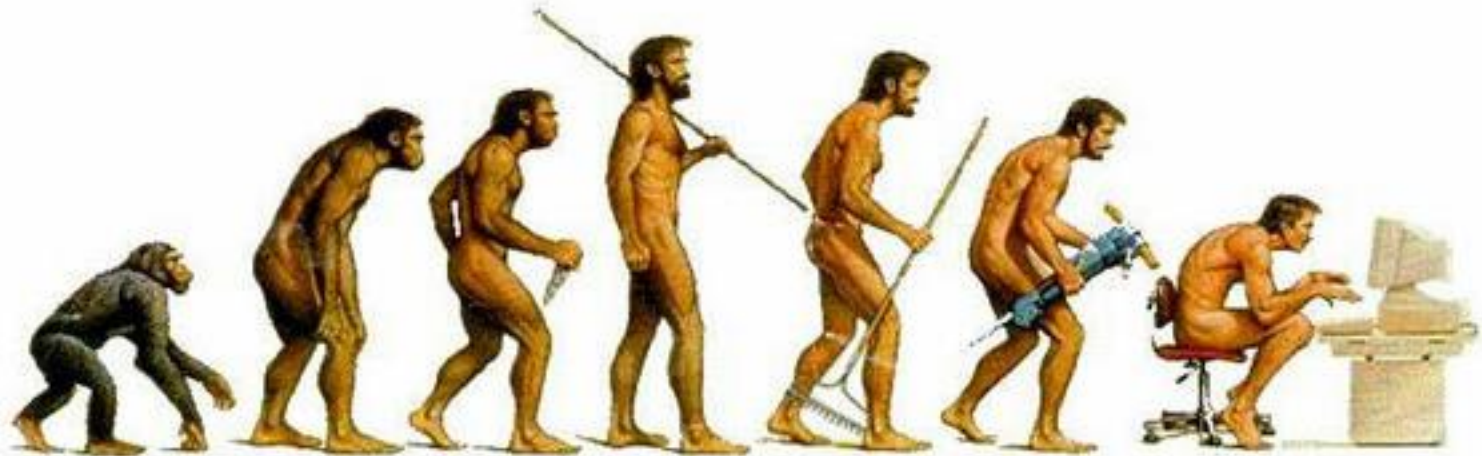

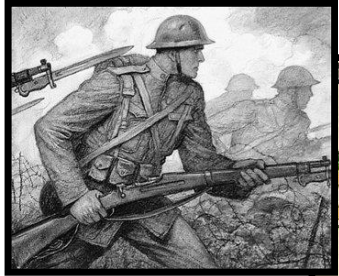

Silent Generation

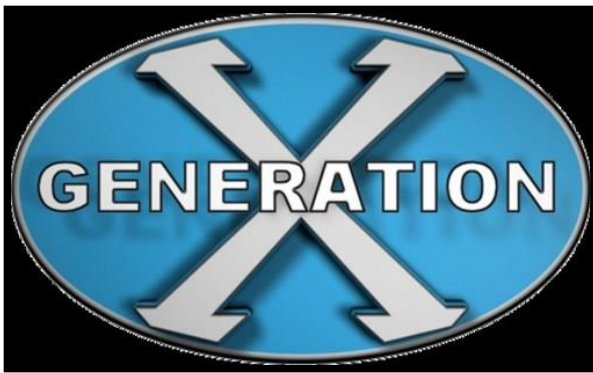
– born 1925-1945, fought in WWII, Victory gardens, quiet, hard-working Traditionalists, Rosie the Riveter, parents of early baby boomers



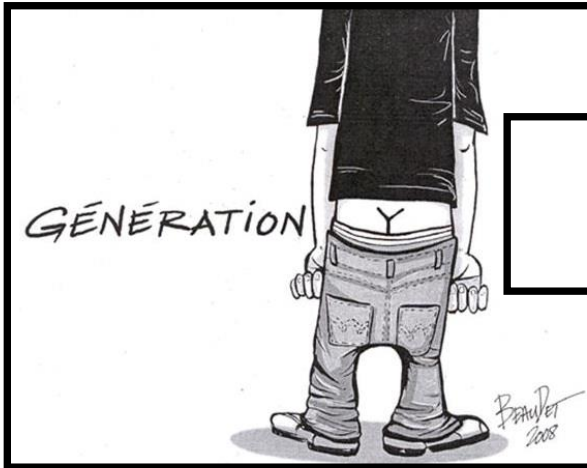

“Millennials”

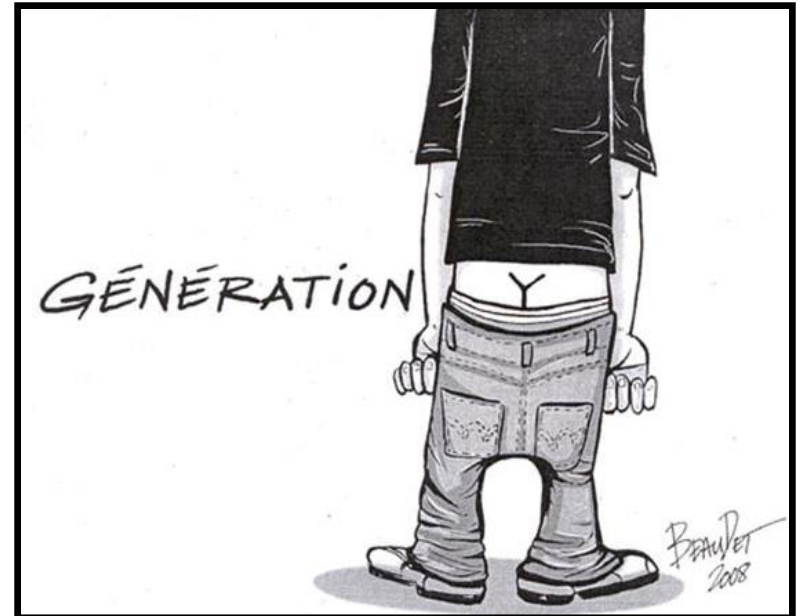
team players, overindulged by parents, rule followers, close to their parents

They have no work ethic and will be bad employees

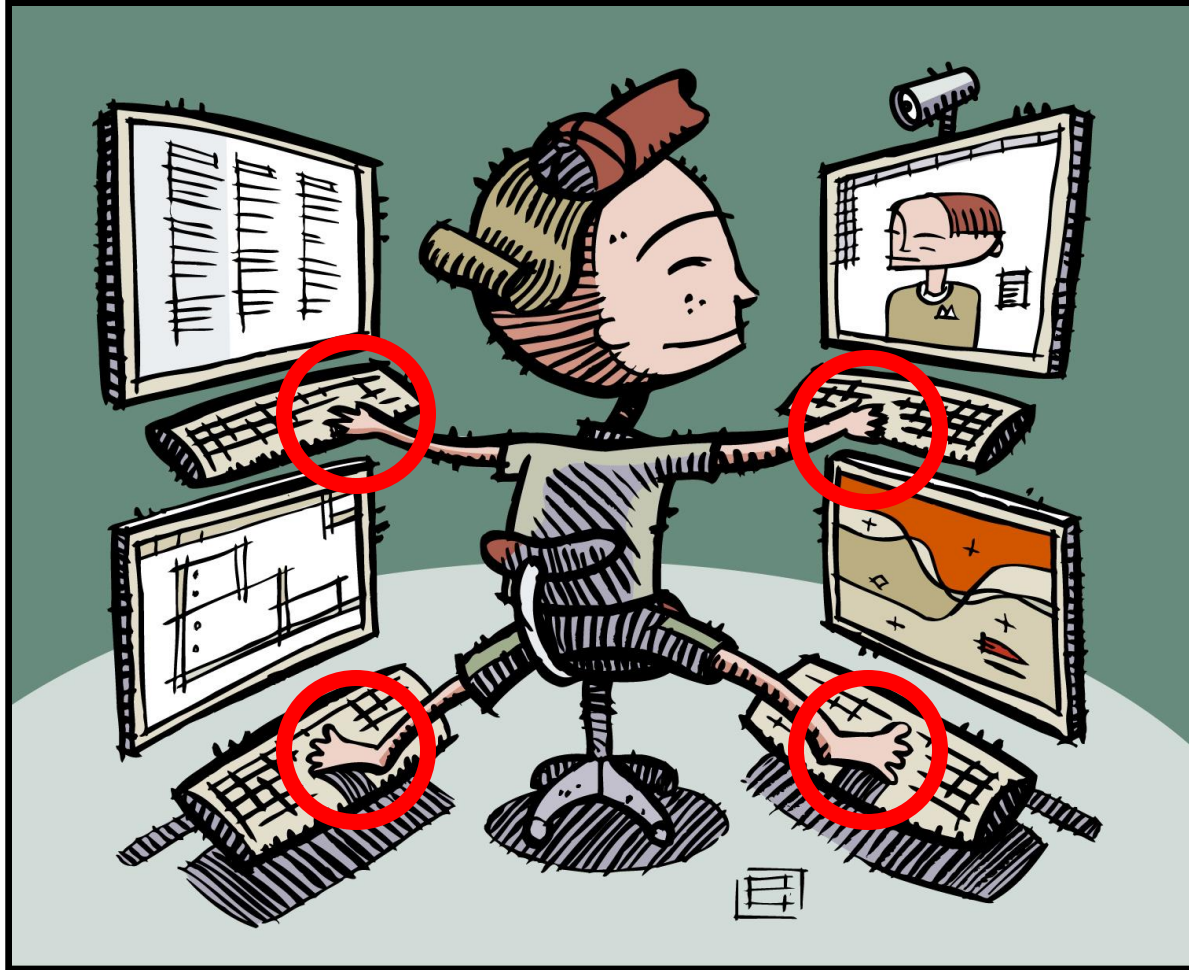

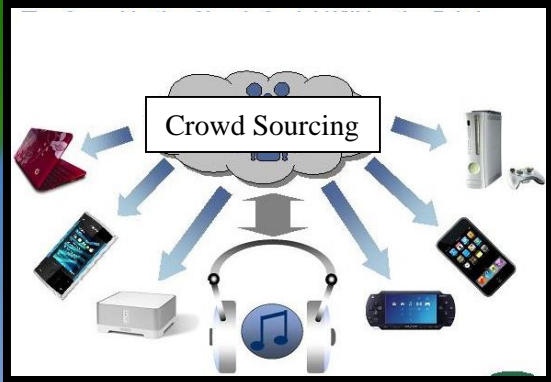

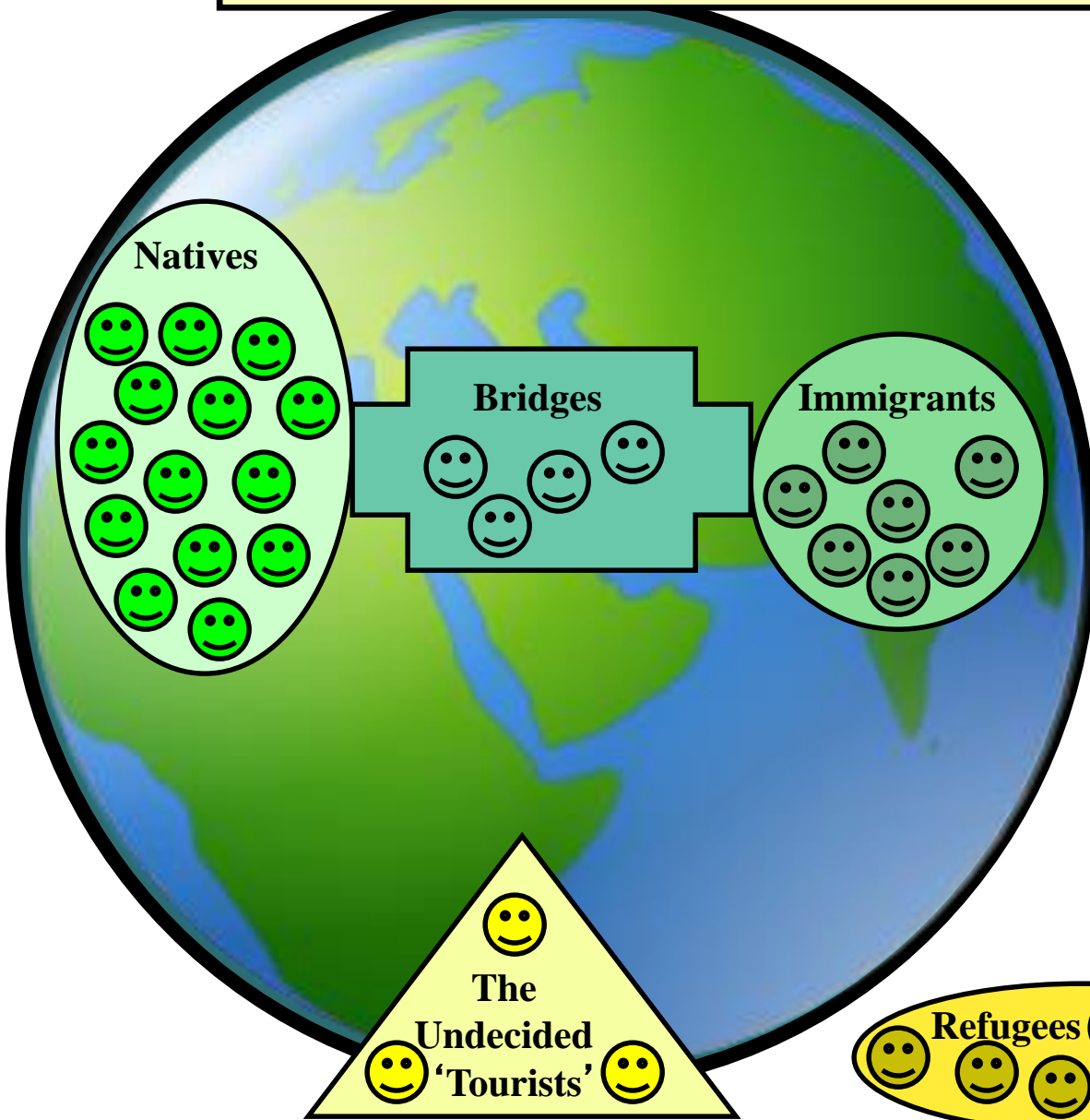

5. Does it all add up ?

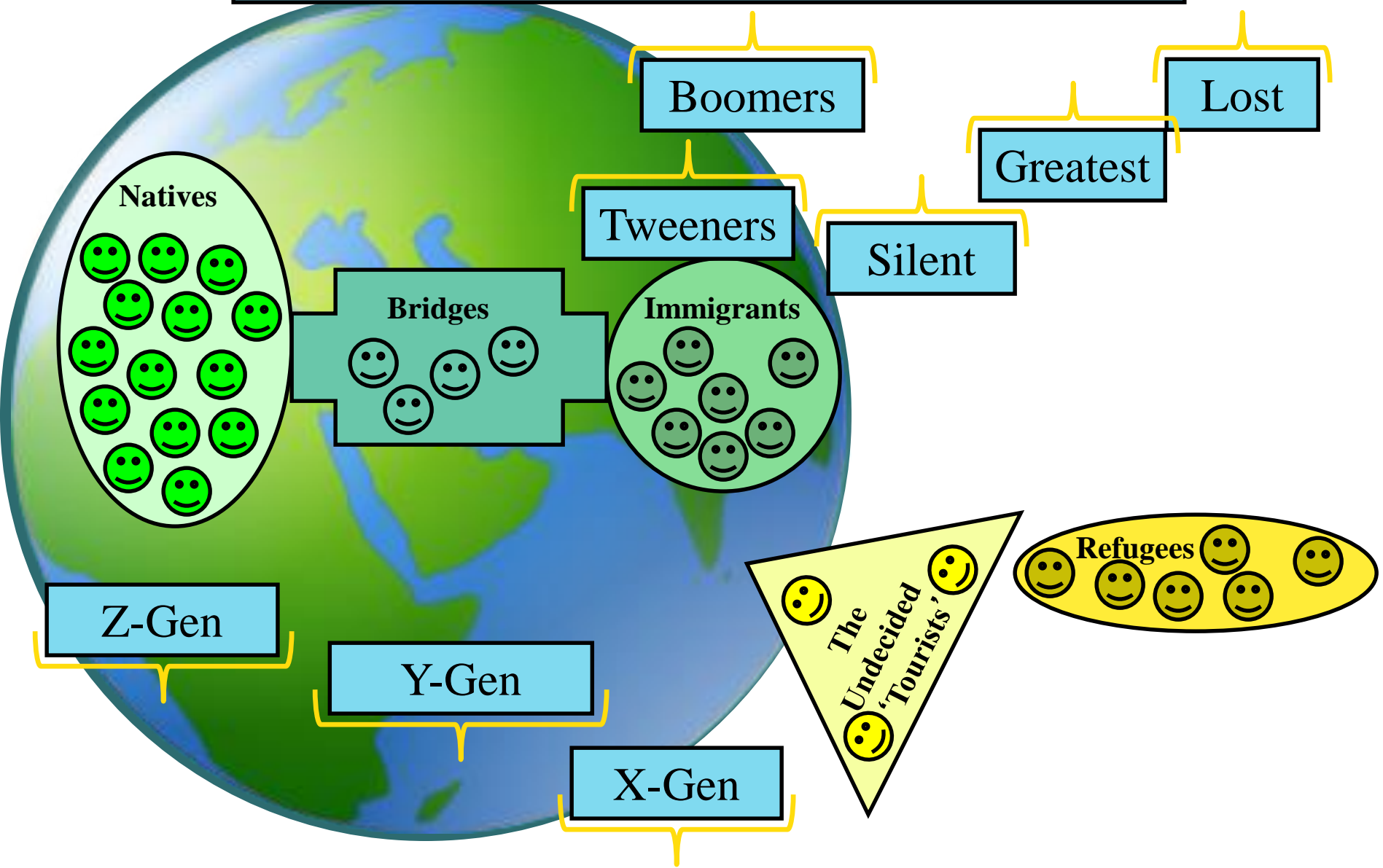

The Refugees: The older adults in society who have chosen to flee rather than integrate into the native culture. Prefer receiving information quickly from multiple sources

Prefer slow and controlled release of information from limited sources

Prefer parallel processing and multitasking

Prefer singular processing and single or limited tasking

Prefer processing pictures, sounds, and video before text

Prefer to provide text before pictures, sounds, and video

Prefer random access to hyperlinked multimedia information

Prefer to provide information linearly, logically and sequentially

Prefer to interact/network simultaneously with many others

Prefer students to work independently rather than network and interact

Prefer to learn “just-in-time” from multiple sources

Prefer to teach “just-in-case” (it’s on the exam)

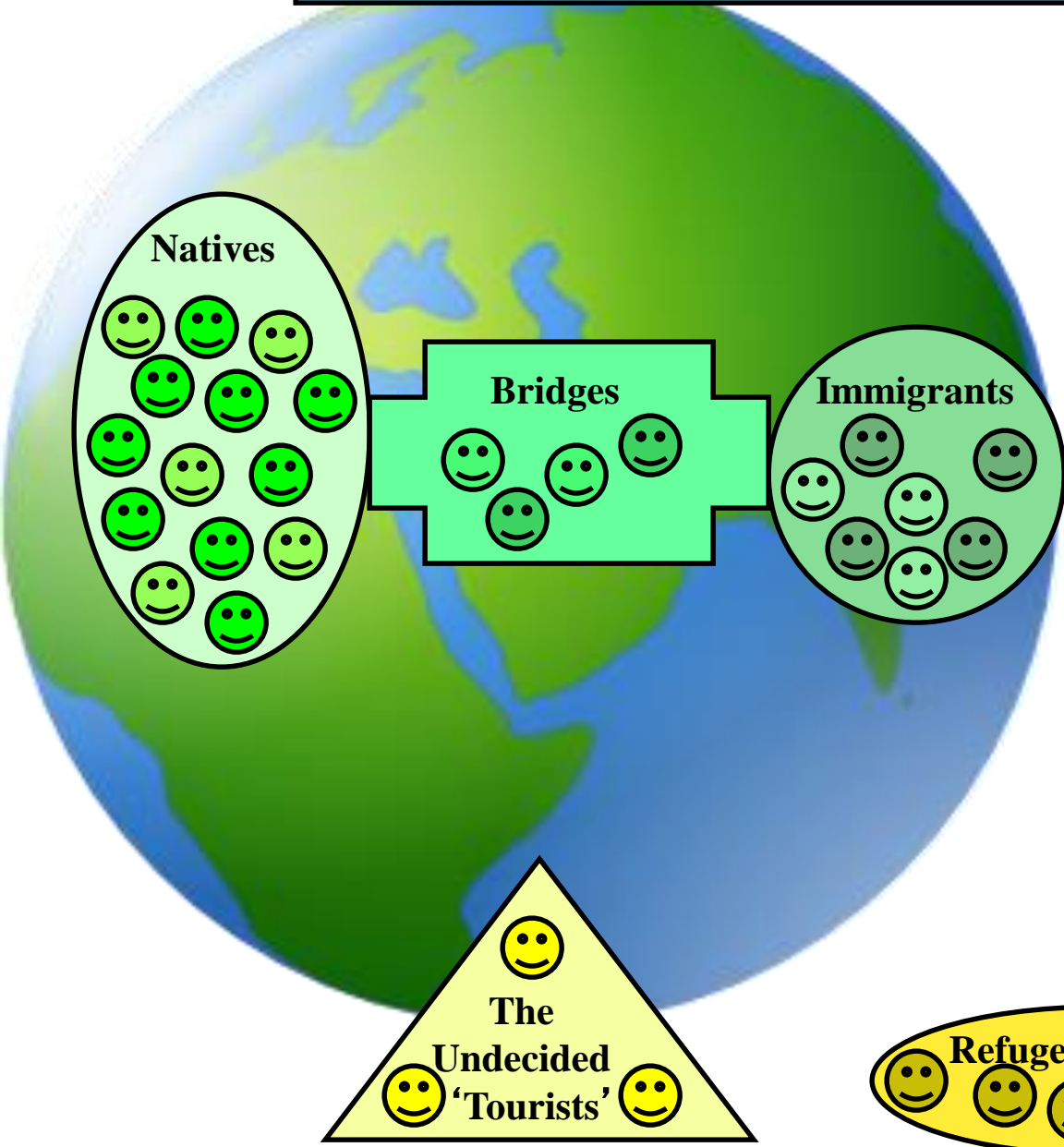
Prefer instant gratification and instant rewards

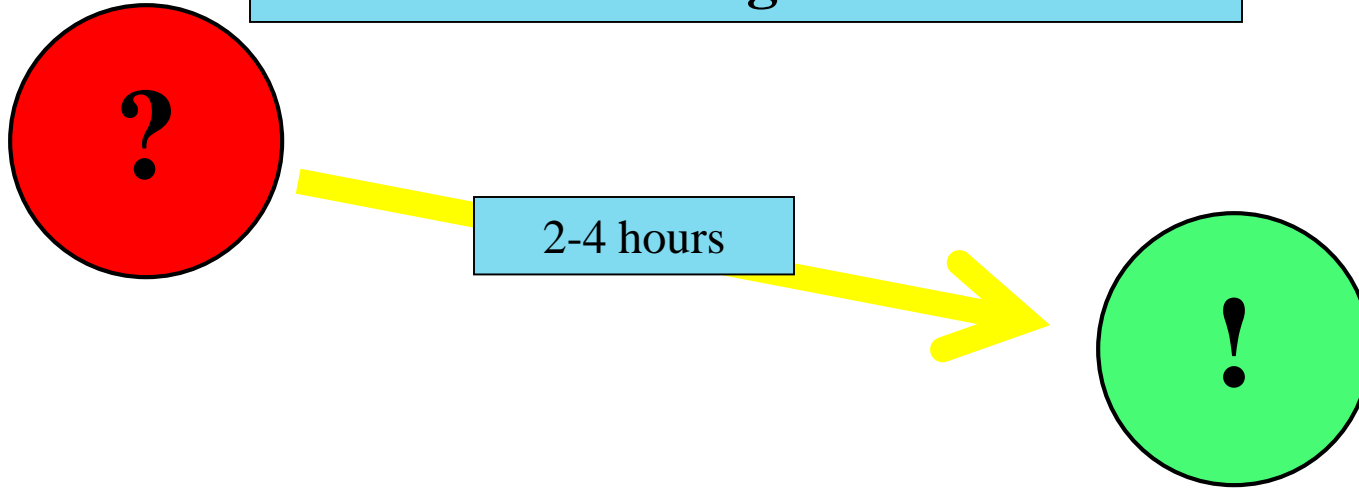


Natives and Immigrants are not homogenous populations

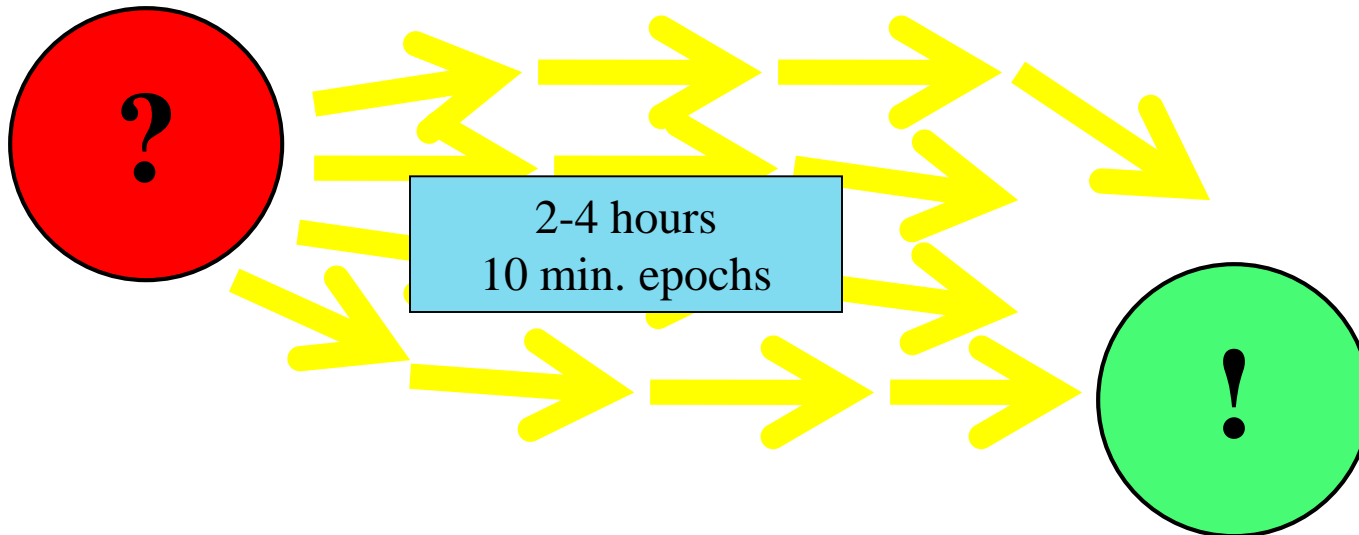
They are variably fluent in this new language


Previous Cycle Rate – 10 years

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Where Can We Go ?

- Move away from ppt/lectures
- Bring simulation into first and second year classes creating an immediately useful curriculum
- Class for entering students on how to vet internet sites.
- Think out of the box with new ideas
 - focus groups with entering students on digital technologies they use
 - consider using social networking technologies for PBL's
 - Facebook, LinkedIn, Twitter, Myspace
 - Google Docs
 - 'crowd sourcing'
 - mobile/ubiquitous computing
 - webinars
 - gaming 'philosophy', not necessarily gaming to medical education

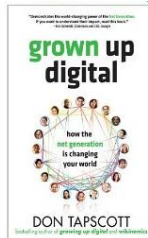

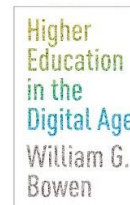
