Guidelines for Chicago 18

See Chicago Style guide for how to cite a chapter of a book, a part of an edited volume, translated or edited books, sources with multiple authors, book reviews, interviews, social media content, videos or podcasts, and more specifics on websites. This is just a jumping off point for the most common citations.

Obsculta uses Notes and Bibliography Style. All bibliographies should be indented after the first line.

Book

<u>Footnote</u>: First name Last name, *Book Title* (Publisher, Year), page number. Charles Yu, *Interior Chinatown* (Pantheon Books, 2020), 45.

<u>Footnote Shortened</u>: Last name, *Book Title*, page number. Yu, *Interior Chinatown*, 48.

<u>Bibliography</u>: Last name, First Name Middle initial. *Book Title*. Publisher, Year of publication. Yu, Charles. *Interior Chinatown*. Pantheon Books, 2020.

<u>Things to Note:</u> place of publication is no longer required in book footnotes or bibliography.

Chapter from Book

<u>Footnote:</u> First name Last name, "Chapter Title," in *Book Title* (Publisher, Year), page number. Kathleen Doyle, "The Queen Mary Psalter," in *The Book by Design: The Remarkable Story of the World's Greatest Invention*, ed. P. J. M. Marks and Stephen Parkin (University of Chicago Press, 2023), 64.

<u>Footnote Shortened</u>: Last name, "Chapter Title", page number. Doyle, "Queen Mary Psalter," 65.

<u>Bibliography:</u> Last name, First Name Middle initial. "Chapter Title". In *Book Title*. Publisher, Year of publication.

<u>Things to Note</u>: Page ranges for a chapter of a book are no longer required in bibliography entries.

Journal

<u>Footnote</u>: First name Last name, "Article title," *Journal Title* Volume Number, issue no. # (month and year of publication): page number, DOI link or database accessed through. <u>Footnote Shortened</u>: Last name, "Article title shortened," page number. Dickstein, "A Literature of One's Own," 73.

<u>Bibliography:</u> Last name, First name Middle initial. "Article Title." *Journal Name* volume number, issue no. # (Publication month/year): page number. DOI link or database accessed through.

<u>Things to Note</u>: having a DOI is preferred but older articles may not have one. Works with more than two authors should check the style guide for further information.

<u>Footnote</u>: First name Last name, "Title," *Magazine/Newspaper Title*, Month Date, Year of publication, page number, URL.

Footnote Shortened: Last name, "Title shortened."

<u>Bibliography</u>: Last name, First name. "Full Title." *Magazine/Newspaper Title*, Month Day, Year. Website/name of database if applicable.

<u>Things to Note</u>: Since the author is often known by a title, there is no first, last name. Popes and Saints are not given titles either, but purely their name. Ex: Augustine (not St. Augustine or Augustine of Hippo) and Benedict XVI (not Pope Benedict XVI). If no personal author is listed, and instead the work is produced by a Council or an administrative body, list that as the author. Section numbers are abbreviated: sec. Number [not written out in full].

Bible

Things to Note: References to the Jewish or Christian scriptures usually appear in text citations or notes rather than in bibliographies. This means instead of creating a footnote, use parenthesis and include the citation within your text. Also, include the Bible Translation you are using after the citation.

Parenthetical or note references to the Bible should include book (in roman and usually abbreviated), chapter, and verse—never a page number. A colon is used between chapter and verse. Note that the traditional abbreviations use periods but the shorter forms do not. For guidance on when to abbreviate and when not to, see <u>10.50</u>. For full forms and abbreviations, see 10.51, 10.52, 10.53.

<u>Traditional abbreviations:</u> (Book abbreviated. Chapter: Verse, Bible Translation). (1 Thess. 4:11, 5:2–5, 5:14, New Revised Standard Version). (Heb. 13:8, 13:12, New International Version).

Shorter abbreviations: (Book abbreviated Chapter: Verse, Translation). 2 Sm 11:1–17, 11:26–27 (RSV). Jo 5:9–12 (NAB).

<u>Things to Note:</u> If you are citing more than one article at a time, the abbreviation is "arts" not "a."

<u>Footnote:</u> First name Last name, *Title*, trans. (Publisher, year published), Part number, q. question number, a. article number. Online Publisher.

Things to Note: Currently only the first edition of the Catechism of the Catholic Church is available on the Vatican website, it is therefore recommended that you access the second edition,

as cited above, if using an online version. Additionally, instead of page numbers or section numbers, paragraph numbers are used in citations for the Catechism.
